Fireside Chat: Justice



In my last chat I began some commentary on the US Catholic Bishops' 2018 statement on racism, *Open wide our hearts*. I mentioned some heroes of civil rights such as Rosa Parks, Daisy Bates, Martin Luther King, Jr. and James Meredith. There are many more, including John Lewis who died recently and even President Lyndon Johnson who signed the Voting Rights Act of 1965.

The bishops speak of "conscious and unconscious" racism that "flow from the same prejudicial root" – a root that affects generations of people unless it is detected and dealt with honestly.

Racism does not begin and end with the treatment of African Americans in the US, as shameful as that has been; other minorities such as Native Americans, Hispanos, Vietnamese, the Japanese in the aftermath of World War II, and Muslims have been targeted as well.

The bishops ask, "**How do we overcome the evil of rejecting a brother or sister's humanity, the same evil that provoked Cain's sin? What are the necessary steps that would lead to this conversion? We find our inspiration in the words of the prophet Micah: 'You have been told, O mortal, what is good, and what the Lord requires of you: Only to do justice, and to love goodness, and to walk humbly with your God'**" (Mic. 6:8).

To do justice, say the bishops, "requires an honest acknowledgement of our failures and the restoring of right relationships between us".

To love goodness, they say, is to pursue, in the words of St. Paul to the Romans, "what leads to peace and to building up one another" (14:19).

This process, they say, "requires humility; it requires each of us to ask for the grace needed to overcome this sin and get rid of this scourge".

I would like to spend the rest of today's chat discussing what the bishops say about **justice** – the first requirement that God asks of us who purport to believe in him.

"For a nation to be just," the bishops write, "it must be a society that recognizes and respects the legitimate rights of individuals and peoples". The CCC states in section 1930, that these rights flow from a person's dignity as a creature and that these rights are prior to society. A society undermines its own moral legitimacy by not recognizing these God-given rights. Our Judeo-Christian tradition tells us that God created humans in his own image, "in the image of God he created them; male and female he created them" (Gen 1:26-27).

This image, of course, is interior. By this image scripture means the dominion God has given humans over the rest of creation, as in the first chapter of Genesis. We can surmise from this that humans are not to be dominated by others, certainly not to be bought and sold as slaves.

Being created by God has another aspect, say the bishops. Our creating God is a trinity of co-equal Persons, an eternal relationship into which we have been invited. To share the very life of God, to be created in God's image and to share in his creative power, is pure gift. To be in personal relationship with this relating God naturally overflows into relationship with others, as St. John says in his first letter, "Whoever loves God must love his neighbor" (1 Jn 4:21).

From this interrelatedness, say the bishops, comes the original meaning of justice, "where we are in right relationship with God, with one another, and with the rest of creation". Notice, however, how this original justice is damaged by the first sin. Shame characterizes our first parents, secrecy as they hide from God, and a compromised relationship with creation as the man must "earn his bread by the sweat of his brow", while the earth yields him thorns, while brother kills brother.

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En mi última charla empecé un comentario sobre la declaración sobre racismo por los obispos de los EEUU, Abramos de par en par nuestros corazones, de 2018. Mencioné algunos héroes de derechos civiles como Rosa Parks, Daisy Bates, Martin Luther King, Jr., y James Meredith. Hay muchas más, incluso John Lewis que murió recién y aun presidente Lyndon Johnson que firmó el Acto de Derechos al Voto de 1965.

Los obispos hablan del racismo “consciente e inconsciente” que “fluye de la misma raíz prejudicial” -- una raíz que afecta generaciones de personas a menos que se detecta y se lida honestamente.

El racismo no empieza y termina con el trato de los americanos africanos en los EEUU, aunque ha sido vergonzoso; las otras minoridades, como americanos nativos, hispanos, vietnameses, japoneses en las secuelas de la Segunda Guerra Mundial, y los musulmanes han sido blancos también.

Preguntan los obispos, “¿Cómo vamos a vencer la maldad de rechazar la humanidad de un hermano o hermana, la misma maldad que provocó el pecado de Caín? Encontramos nuestra inspiración en las palabras del profeta Miqueas: “El Señor ya te ha dicho, O hombre, en qué consiste lo bueno y qué es lo que él espera de ti: que hagas justicia, que seas fiel y leal y que camines humildemente con tu Dios”.

Hacer justicia, dicen los obispos, “requiere un reconocimiento de nuestros fracasos y la restauración de las relaciones justas entre nosotros”. El amar lo bueno, dicen, es perseguir, en las palabras de san Pablo, “todo lo que conduce a la paz y con ello podremos ayudarnos en construirse unos a otros”.

Este proceso, dicen los obispos, “requiere la humildad; requiere que cada uno de nosotros pida la gracia de vencer este pecado y librarnos de este azote”. Quiero usar el resto de esta charla en discutir lo que los obispos dicen sobre la justicia – el primer requisito que Dios nos pide de nosotros que pretendemos creer en él.

“Para ser justa,” escriben los obispos, “una nación tiene que ser una sociedad que reconoce y respeta los derechos legítimos de individuos y pueblos”. En el Catecismo de la Iglesia Católica, párrafo 1930, leemos que “el respeto de la persona humana implica el de los derechos que se derivan de su dignidad de criatura. Estos derechos son anteriores a la sociedad y se imponen a ella” (fin de la citación). Una sociedad socava su propia legitimidad moral por no reconocer estos derechos dados por Dios. Nuestra tradición judeocristiana nos dice que Dios creó a los humanos en su propia imagen, “Los creó parecidos a Dios mismo; hombre y mujer los creó”.

Esta imagen, claro, es interior. Por esta imagen la escritura quiere decir el dominio dado a los humanos por Dios sobre la creación, como en el primer capítulo de Génesis. De esto conjeturamos que los humanos no deben ser dominados por los demás, ciertamente que no sean comprados y vendidos como esclavos.

Siendo creados por Dios tiene otro aspecto, dicen los obispos. Nuestro Dios creador es una Trinidad de Personas iguales, una relación eterna en la cual hemos sido invitados. Compartir la vida misma de Dios, ser creados en la imagen de Dios y compartir en su poder creativo, es puro don. Estar en una relación personal con este Dios naturalmente rebosa en relaciones con los demás, como dice san Juan en su primera carta, “El que ama a Dios, ama también a su hermano”.

De esta interrelación, dicen los obispos, deriva el sentido original de la justicia, “en donde estamos en una correcta relación con Dios, uno con el otro, y con el resto de la creación”. Noten, sin embargo, como esta justicia original es dañada por el primer pecado. La vergüenza caracteriza a nuestros primeros padres, el secreto cuando se esconden de Dios, y una relación comprometida con la creación, porque el hombre tuvo que “ganar su pan con el sudor de su frente,” mientras la tierra le produce espinos y hermano mata a hermano.

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As a result, say the bishops, "... as a nation there has been very limited formal acknowledgement of the harm done to so many, no moment of atonement, no national process of reconciliation and, all too often a neglect of our history".

Not enough can be said here about Native Americans, their ill treatment by the American government, its blindness to their dignity, and how their land was systematically taken from them. Many of them did convert to Christianity through the missionary efforts of those like Junipero Serra in the Southwest and we honor today St. Kateri Tekakwitha; and buried in St. Joseph Cemetery in Pine Bluff is Quapaw Chief Saracen, a Catholic convert. Next time we'll see what the bishops say about loving goodness as we try to walk humbly with our God.

Nor must we forget our brothers and sisters who speak Spanish. Our parish has been blessed by the joyous and colorful faith of people from Mexico and the countries of Central and South America. I think everyone in the parish has enjoyed their foods in restaurants and, not least at our parish festival. But many of these brothers and sisters are concerned about their immigration status.

The bishops comment, "Since the Mexican-American War [1846-1848], Hispanics from various countries have experienced discrimination in housing, employment, healthcare, and education". I would add here that recently the DACA provision, Delayed Action for Childhood Arrivals, has been given new life by the Supreme Court, meaning that those brought to the US as children, though illegally, are free to stay here and pursue their education and their careers.

The US Bishops conclude this section on justice in their pastoral letter by saying, "These examples from the experiences of Native, African, and Hispanic Americans demonstrate how, as a nation, we have never sufficiently contended with the impact of overt racism". Until we do, the justice required by God will not be achieved.

In closing this chat I'd like to recommend the movies Green Book and To Kill a Mockingbird and the book White Fragility for a better understanding of the injustice of our treatment of Blacks in America; the book Bury my Heart at Wounded Knee for insight into the Native American experience in the 19th century; and the movie Frontera, about a friendship between an Anglo rancher and a Mexican migrant. Next time we'll see what the bishops say about loving goodness as we try to walk humbly with our God.

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Como resultado, dicen los obispos, "... como una nación ha sido limitado reconocimiento formal del daño hecho a tan muchos, no momento de expiación, no proceso nacional de reconciliación y, todo demasiado a menudo una negligencia de nuestra historia". No podemos decir bastante sobre los americanos nativos, el mal tratamiento por el gobierno americano, su ceguera a su dignidad, y como su tierra era robada de ellos sistemáticamente. Muchos de ellos se convirtieron al cristianismo por los esfuerzos de esos como san Junípero Serra en el suroeste y los misionarios en el noreste de América y Canadá, como Sta. Kateri Tekakwitha.

Ni debemos olvidar a nuestros hermanos y hermanas que hablan español. Nuestra parroquia ha sido bendecida por la alegre y colorida fe del pueblo de México y los países de Central y Sudamérica. Creo que todos en la parroquia han disfrutado su comida en los restaurantes y en nuestro festival parroquial. Pero muchos de estos hermanos y hermanas se preocupan sobre su estatus de inmigración.

Según los obispos, "Desde la guerra entre México y América [en el siglo 19], hispanos de varios países han experimentado discriminación en alojamiento, el empleo, la atención médica y educación". Añadiría aquí que recientemente la provisión DACA ha sido dada una nueva vida por el Corte Supremo de los EEUU, es decir, que ellos llevados a los EEUU en su niñez, aunque ilegalmente, son libres quedarse aquí y perseguir su educación y sus carreras.

Los obispos de los EEUU concluyen esta sección sobre la justicia en su carta pastoral por decir, "Estos ejemplos de las experiencias de nativos, africanos e hispanos americanos demuestran, como nación, nunca nos hemos enfrentado con el impacto del racismo abierto". Hasta que lo hacemos, la justicia requerido por Dios no se logrará.

Para terminar esta charla, quiero sugerir la películas Green Book y To Kill a Mockingbird y el libro White Fragility para un mejor entendimiento de la injusticia de nuestro tratamiento de los Negros en América; el libro Bury my Heart at Wounded Knee para una percepción de la experiencia de los nativos americanos en el siglo 19; y la película Frontera sobre la amistad entre un anglo ranchero y un migrante mexicano. En la próxima charla discutiremos lo que dicen los obispos sobre amando lo bueno mientras tratamos de caminar humildemente con Dios.



What is RIDL?

Retreat in Daily Life is the common designation of the 19th Annotation St. Ignatius of Loyola wrote into his Spiritual Exercises. These spiritual exercises evolved through St. Ignatius' own experience as he transformed from a soldier to a servant of our loving God. As you mirror his prayerful journey, following the life, teachings, death, and resurrection of Jesus, you will prayerfully encounter a loving God and desire to become all you were created to be.

Ask yourself:

What are you willing to give up for a deeper, more intimate relationship with God?

Retreat Format

During the course of 30 weeks -- from late September through early May -- retreatants live their commitment to God, to themselves, and to their fellow participants by following the steps of this prayer journey. Each retreatant commits to these activities:

- Daily private prayer, which includes Scripture, reflection, and journaling.
- Weekly small group meetings in which participants share their prayer experiences with each other. Groups are facilitated by a spiritual guide.
- Individual 19th annotation retreat experiences will be considered upon request.
- Twice monthly individual spiritual direction.

The whole experience was so good that instead of saying "the 30 weeks are through," we decided to keep meeting because we formed a bond with the others in the group as well as with Jesus and His Blessed Mother."

The fee for the retreat is \$490.00 plus a director fee that must be coordinated with your Spiritual Director. In keeping with the Rule of Benedict governing hospitality, those who have been blessed with more may wish to contribute more, and those who have less give less so that "all may be at peace in the house of God." Scholarships are available. To inquire about a scholarship, contact the Spiritual Director in your area.

OUR PROGRAM

All of our courses are taught by certified Spiritual Directors, many of whom graduated from St. Scholastica's 5-year Spiritual Director Training Program. Participants are welcome to attend one of our retreats, directed or nondirected, and/or silent. This program helps individuals who seek to develop a deeper relationship with God. With the companionship of our Spiritual Directors, you will learn to identify ways in which God is working in your life. This is a key component to the Spirituality Program offered by St. Scholastica. Individuals may enroll in Retreat in Daily Life, Ignatius Transposed, and Spiritual Classics.

OUR CLASSES

Retreat in Daily Life (RIDL): An Ignatian prayer process that focuses on scripture passages that lead retreatants to the realization of how much and how deeply God loves them.

Spiritual Classics: Discovering some of the 'giants' of the spiritual life; finding they are human beings just like ourselves, with some of the same issues with God and the spiritual growth process.

Ignatius Transposed: A 'Retreat in Daily Life' through the lens of Pierre Teilhard de Chardin's Evolutionary Spirituality, based on Louis M. Savary's book, *The New Spiritual Exercises - In the Spirit of Pierre Teilhard de Chardin*. Designed by Rev. Dr. Bob Gardenhire III, founder of HeartPaths DFW. This retreat builds on the foundation that St. Ignatius gives in RIDL

Retreats: Private retreats to renew and refresh your spirit. Offered for durations of 2, 3, 4, or 8 days. Onsite at the Ministries Building, 3-day Silent Directed Retreat in January 2021 offered at Subiaco, Arkansas. Space is limited.



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
